Our Great Responsibility:

A Selection of Bill W.'s General Service Talks 1951-1970

A.A.'s first new book in over 30 years, *Our Great Responsibility*, is a collection of 16 of Bill W.'s talks at the General Service Conferences from 1951 to 1970. The original tapes from the conferences have been painstakingly transcribed and carefully formed into a narrative which not only gives us great insight into our history, and that of the Conference, but it also allows us to get a real sense of Bill W. as a person.

This volume contains some never before published archival images and photos, more than 60 in total, including some from our early Conferences. I love seeing pictures of Bill and Lois, Sister Ignatia and other friends of Alcoholics Anonymous, as well as images of some of our early literature. Also included are 3 Conference talks by non-alcoholics; Bill's wife, Lois, and two of our Class A Trustees, Bernard Smith and Dr. John Norris.

Bill's great love of Alcoholics Anonymous, and his desire to leave our Fellowship with a solid structure that would facilitate communication between its members and the G.S.O. and Trustees are evident throughout this book. The origins of our General Service Conference come to life as we hear, first hand, about its trials and successes. Bill's comments on communication, cooperating with professionals, and the need to get more people involved in service are thoughtful and timely.

Bill W.'s messages to the General Service Conference still speak to the needs of our Fellowship today: "The essence of all growth is willingness to change for the better and then an unremitting willingness to shoulder whatever the responsibility, at whatever price. ... As we look toward the future, we clearly see that an ever-greater willingness will surely be the key to that progress which God intends for us as we move toward His appointed destiny."



Spotlight on District 36

In August of 1940 the first efforts were made by Roger B. from Philadelphia to bring the A.A. message to Harrisburg. Roger's initial efforts were unsuccessful. However, on March 3, 1941 Roger was transferred by his company to Harrisburg and on June 18, 1941, along with five other recovering alcoholics, he started a meeting at his sister's home. On August 16, 1941, the meeting had to move, due to its growth to nine members. In years following, Area 59 was formed, starting with 12 districts in 1977, and growing into our area and districts as we know them today.

District 36 is a very large district in comparison to other district sizes. There is currently a large part of our district that is inactive. Our district includes Harrisburg, Hershey, Middletown, Linglestown, Dillsburg, Lemoyne, New Cumberland, Camp Hill, Carlisle, and many other towns. Harrisburg has been the capital of Pennsylvania since 1812. Harrisburg is known for the building of the Pennsylvania Canal and later the Pennsylvania Railroad. In recent years Harrisburg is known for the Pennsylvania Farm Show, the largest free indoor agriculture exposition in the United States and the best milkshakes you will ever taste! Hershey is known as "the Sweetest Place on Earth" as it is home to a large number of chocolate making companies. Carlisle is host to Dickinson College, Penn State Dickinson School of Law, and the U.S. Army War College. The Carlisle Barracks prepare high-level military personnel and civilians for strategic leadership responsibilities.

District 36 is home to 71 registered groups. You can find a meeting to attend morning, afternoon, and night -we have no shortage of meetings in District 36! We have two intergroups in District 36, the Harrisburg Area Intergroup (HAI) and the Cumberland Valley Intergroup (CVI). Currently, Harrisburg Area Intergroup provides active communication to District 36. Harrisburg Intergroup is responsible for the A.A. hotline, PI, CPC, and literature sales. HAI's most recent addition is the Accessibilities Committee which is responsible for insuring that A.A. is accessible to all members in our local area. Our district also has a strong and long running young people's presence. Beginning in 1993, the 5th annual PENNSCYPAA was held in Harrisburg, then again in 2001, 2008, and most recently 2013. Cumberland Valley hosted PENNSCYPAA in 2018. Harrisburg has an active PA ICYPAA Bid Committee. The Young People's Group Meeting Group is one of the largest meetings in our district with 80 plus people.

District 36 has 4 subcommittees and an ad-hoc subcommittee: Workshop, Finance, Archives, Structure, and District-Split. Our district meeting is held on the second Monday of every month from 6:30 pm to 8 pm at the 19th Street Clubhouse in Harrisburg. We have participation from 25 GSR's. At our monthly meeting we receive reports from: DCM, ADCM, Treasurer, all subcommittees, Harrisburg Area Intergroup, and ICYPAA Bid Committee. We have a presentation on a Concept at the beginning of each meeting and at the end of the meeting there is a Tradition presentation.
