## A little history . . .

The idea for a joint workshop between Eastern Pennsylvania General Service Assembly (EPGSA) and the Philadelphia Intergroup (now Southeastern PA Intergroup Association or SEPIA), came from an event held in Manhattan called the Share-A-Day Program. Frank D., the Vice-President of Philadelphia Intergroup, first presented the idea on October 21, 1988. It was enthusiastically accepted by all as a way to promote UNITY between the Area and Intergroup. Reba W. was EPGSA Delegate and encouraged full participation in this joint venture.

A Statement of Purpose was developed: "This event will be designed to inform the fellowship in the Philadelphia Five-County area of the Twelfth Step opportunities available so that we may better do our common job of reaching the alcoholic who still suffers." A planning committee was formed and the theme of the first Share-A-Day in Philadelphia was The Beginning of Sobriety. It was held on February 23, 1989. It was decided that it should be geared toward getting the "newcomer" involved in service.
