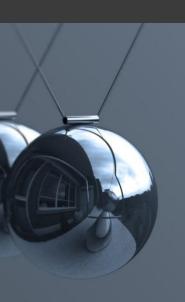

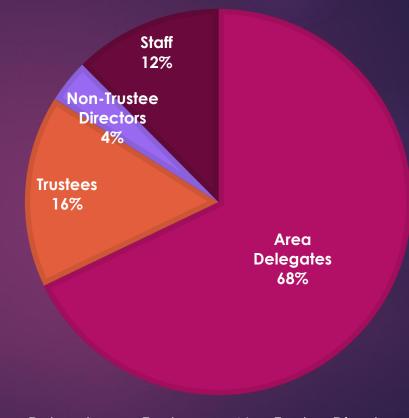

75th General Service Conference Takes its Inventory



Conference Inventory Process



Online survey conducted by GSO prior to conference. All voting members participate – Delegates (74s & 75s), Trustees, NTD's and Staff). 19 questions posed on the effectiveness of the Conference.



15 groups discussed responses and own experiences on 4 questions each during the first day of Conference. Then each reported back to the Conference over a 3 day, each period followed by a sharing session.



"An overview report on the conference inventory will be included in the 2025 Final Conference Report." "A separate digital Comprehensive Inventory Report will be produced after the inventory process is complete."

Sample Inventory Question

What actions do we take to ensure the final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world services always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship? What could we do better?

Trust the process. Work together. Encourage minority. Incorporate as much feedback as possible. Common welfare is important

Spiritual principles, not power. Rotation is so critical. Fellowship is final authority.

Need for communication. Timelier more clear communication. Trust and inclusion so important. Participation challenges. Lack of understanding of Concepts 1 and 2.

Not enough transparency and communication. When we struggle to get the communication we need, everyone hurts. Not enough information on resignations. Areas are frustrated.

Challenges

- Trusted servant leadership rather than governance maintains focus on spiritual principles.
- Communication Problems:
 - Slow, inconsistent, and insufficient communication between the Board, GSO, Delegates, and Groups.
 - Delayed delivery of background information makes meaningful feedback from groups difficult.
 - Not enough explanation behind decisions, causing distrust.
 - Use of overly technical or confusing language. Need simplified reporting.

- Participation Challenges:
 - Low participation at Area assemblies and in the General Service structure overall.
 - Disconnected groups and uninformed members weaken the process.
 - Many groups lack GSRs, leading to gaps in representation.
- Authority Imbalance:
 - Concerns that the Trustees and Board control too much of what reaches the Conference.
 - Some feel floor actions and PAIs (Proposed Agenda Items) are filtered or mishandled.

What Are We Doing Well?

Literature

- World-wide literature translations, carrying the A.A. message
- Use of media increasing and becoming more stable/viable
- Sheer volume of printed literature annually in three languages
- Committee Process
 - Committee System works very well to handle the work presented
 - Minority voices are heard and respected

How the Conference Operates

How the Conference Operates

Generally speaking, the General Service Conference follows a modified version of Robert's Rules of Order and proceeds on as informal a basis as possible consistent with the rights of all concerned. Over the years the Conference has adopted some exceptions to Robert's Rules, which help it to proceed more closely in accord with the spirit of A.A. Tradition. It is important to remember that the purpose of following a modified version of Robert's Rules of Order is to make it easier for the Conference to productively conduct its business; to allow the Conference to do what it needs to do to carry out the will of the Fellowship by reaching an informed group conscience. The two Co-chairpersons of the Conference General Service Board Chair and the General Manger) serve as guides to our process and procedures with help from the Conference Members. At the beginning of our open session, following roll call, the voting members review and agree to our procedures and process. Members are encouraged to trust the process and support the co-chairpersons to keep the Conference moving to complete important and critical work.

Conference Quorum

A Conference quorum — two-thirds of all registered members is required to conduct Conference business.

Conference Week Schedule

Thanks to contributions from A.A. members from across the US and Canada, an ambitious Conference Schedule and final agenda is produced with the purpose to make the conference work better during the week. The first day involves an opening session where roll call, opening remarks, admissions, presentations and conference activities take place. Each subsequent day of Conference includes morning, atternoon, and evening sessions where conference business is conducted.

Committee System

To the extent possible, important matters to come before the Conference will be handled via the "Committee system." This assures that a large number of questions can be dealt with during Conference week. Each Committee has considered carefully the items before it and presents its recommendations to the Conference as a whole for acceptance or rejection. Recommendations of conference committees are automatically motions that have been made and seconded. Members are asked to refrain from spontaneously amending the work of the Committee; there are no "friendly" amendments under Robert's Rules. Members are encouraged to trust the process.

Appeals to the General Service Conference

Following the ratification of Advisory Actions by the General Service Board, new requests should be proposed as proposed agenda items where additional information can be provided. The 2011 process for certain conference members appealing to the General Service Conference is limited to Conference Members who are not area delegates and must be submitted 30 days or more in advance to be heard at the following General Service Conference and have demonstrated that all other avenues to resolve the issue were attempted.

Correspondence to the General Service Board

Correspondence to the General Service Board is submitted year around on a variety of topics. When there are concerns about advisory actions, the trustees can determine that the Conference acted under heavy stress, they could ask the Conference to consider reconsider reconsideration.

Substantial Unanimity

All matters of policy (Conference Advisory Actions) require substantial unanimity, that is, a two-thirds majority. Any actions, including amendments, that affect an Advisory Action, or motions that might result in such an action, also require a two-thirds majority. Because the number of members present in the hall during the week of Conference varies from time to time, the phrase "two-thirds majority" is taken to time, the phrase "two-thirds majority" is taken to mean two- thirds vote of the Conference members voting, as long as the total vote constitutes a Conference quorum.

Minority Opinion

After each vote on a matter of policy, the side which did not prevail will always be given an opportunity to speak to their position. If the motion passes with two-thirds vote, the minority may speak. If the motion receives a majority vote, but fails to pass for lack of a two-thirds vote, the majority may speak. Remember that saving "minority opinions" for after the vote, when there is no

rebuttal, is a time-waster, for it can force the Conference body to reconsider a question that might well have been decided the first time around if it had been thoroughly examined from all sides.

General Rules of Debate and Voting

Once reports are presented by a committee, a recommendation is discussed and decided upon in a general session instead of the opening session. The following is agreed to at the beginning of each Conference:

- People who wish to speak line up at the microphones and address their comments to the
- Each person may speak for two (2) minutes. If the person requires an interpreter, only the member will be timed. If the speaker opts to speak in English and that is not their first language, they may speak for 3 minutes
- No one may speak for a second time on a topic until all who wish to have spoken for the first time.
- Full discussion of a recommendation should take place before each vote.
- Everyone is entitled to express his or her opinion.
 However, if your perspective has already been stated by someone else, it is not necessary to go to the mic and paraphrase a comment similar to yours.
- Our experience is that premature actions such as amending motions early in the discussion or hastily calling the question can divert attention from the subject at hand, confusing and/or delaying Conference business.
- Conference Members should refrain from any actions that may cause distraction from our purpose, or injure or weaken efforts toward the unity of the Conference and reaching an informed group conscience in a manner that is democratic and respectful in action and spirit.

Motions Made During Conference

When making a motion, come to the microphone and address the chair. There are various types of motions we use to help reach an informed group conscience. The specific rules governing each are on the next page.

Tabling a Motion

Tabling a motion postpones discussion to a later time during the same Conference.

Motion to Recommit

The motion to recommit returns a motion or proposal to the respective trustees' committee or appropriate corporate board for further consideration. A motion to recommit must be seconded, is debatable and can be amended.

Calling the Question

Calling the question may bring debate to a halt while Conference members decide whether to proceed directly to a vote (the question) or go on with the debate.

Reconsideration

A motion to reconsider a vote may be made only by a member who voted with the prevailing side, but it can be seconded by anyone. If the majority votes to reconsider, full debate, pros and cons. is resumed.

Floor Actions

It is possible for a Conference action to come from the floor but any matter which falls within the scope of a Conference committee as a Conference agenda item should first go through that Conference committee as a proposed agenda item, so that the topic may receive due consideration. However, Floor actions may be introduced but are not intended to be an immediate or automatic tool to continue the debate on a nonrecommended item from a conference committee report, or a failed recommendation. Conference members are urged to respect the committee process. Conference members are also urged to consider whether the subject matter of floor action would be better dealt with as a proposed agenda item for the next Conference. Floor actions can be submitted at the start of a session, excluding the opening session, and will be addressed after all committee recommendations have been heard. Any floor action regarding a piece of committee business that has not vet been concluded will be considered out of order. When a floor action is to be heard, its maker will be given two (2) minutes to state the rationale behind the action, after which the chair shall ask if there is a motion that the Conference decline to consider the floor action.

Declining to Consider a Floor Action

A motion to decline to consider a floor action is made without comment.

How the Conference Operates

 - Motions to manage the process like appealing the chair
- Inability to bring floor actions in response to a committee that took no action.

G.S.B. Report Highlights

- Publication of Plain Language Big Book.
- Grapevine celebrated its 80th Anniversary.
- Outside of the regular Board Weekends, your General Service Board has met as a full board twelve times.
- The trustees' committees and subcommittees met more than 130 times during the last board cycle.
 - This is neither healthy nor sustainable in the long term.
- Finalized and adopted a Whistleblower Policy as required by New York State law, a Confidentiality Policy, and a Code of Conduct.
- Developed a procedure for establishing a Compliance Committee to provide a process for dealing with complaints and concerns to be addressed in an objective, impartial way.

GSB Inventory Update



A Strategic Planning and Leadership Ad Hoc committee was formed.

Purpose is to improve communication and trust between the Conference, GSB, and A.A. fellowship.

Focus is on providing training and support to our Board on leadership development, communication, and strategy implementation.

Ad Hoc committee of both trustees and director formed three working groups to take responsibility for moving forward with each of these individual action items.

Board participated in a 3-day retreat for a facilitated leadership and strategic planning session.

Designed to enhance individual and collective leadership skills within the General Service Board.

Improvements noted by Board members included a better appreciation of different leadership styles and feedback methods, and an enhanced understanding of personal leadership capabilities and interactions with others.

Board continues to practice and integrate these skills into its work, providing ongoing feedback and continued learning.



GSB Inventory Update

- Workload subgroup and working group in the General Service Office looking to address workload issues:
 - Challenge is finding solutions that do not simply shift work from one body to another.
 - Need to also examine the amount of work being done at the Conference each year.
 - Number of Proposed Agenda Items affects the volume of work for the Conference.
- Board met for a half-day virtual workshop on the topic of communication with all stakeholders:
 - GSB Trustees, Corporate Directors, Grapevine Publisher, GSO GM, and GSO Staff Coordinator.
 - The current volume of communications is very large. Workload
 - Was surprising to some participants how much is communicated.
 - Opportunity to explore what may be working and what may not be.

GSB Unity Statement

A Statement from the General Service Board of A.A.

Approved February 26, 2025

In response to the recent GSB Inventory, GSC discussions, communications sent to the GSB, and review of other communications distributed on social media or through alternate channels the GSB makes the following statement:

We, the General Service Board (GSB) of Alcoholics Anonymous, reaffirm our commitment to unity and accountability in our service to the Fellowship. In fulfilling our fiduciary duty and our spiritual responsibilities as outlined in our A.A. principles, we must ensure accurate communication.

Recently, we have observed harm caused when some individuals who have held past leadership roles have engaged in sharing misleading, defamatory, and harmful information on social media, in letters, during informal discussions, made attempts to bypass the Conference process and in some cases used their influence to pressure or threaten Conference members. Conference members have reported that these actions have caused difficulties for them in their service to Alcoholics Anonymous. These actions undermine our conference process in its purpose of expressing the group conscience of our entire Fellowship.

We call upon all trusted servants, past and present, to refrain from spreading misinformation, false information, or engaging in harmful conduct, as these cause harm to the Conference, the Fellowship, and the GSO and AAGV staff and employees. These actions threaten A.A. unity and diverts us from our Primary Purpose.

We encourage open and constructive dialogue that reflects the principles of Alcoholics Anonymous, including where there are difficult conversations on divisive matters. Our experience has taught us that such dialogue can, and must, occur in alignment with A.A. principles, and absent of efforts to exert influence or drive by mandate. Together, we can preserve the integrity and unity of A.A., upon which depend our lives and the lives of those to come.

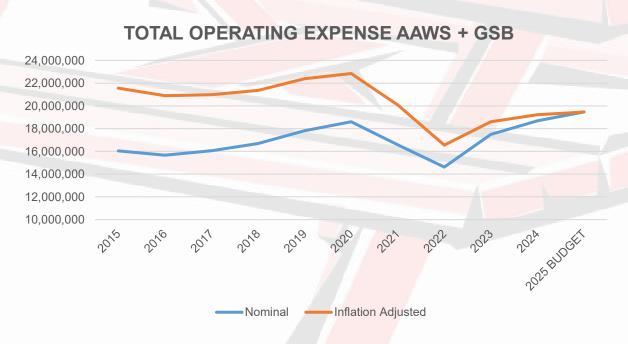

In 2024, operating expense was lower than inflation adjusted operating expense in 7 of the past 9 years.



2024 GRAPEVINE FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- App launch on September 1, 2023 Subscribers with access to the App averaged 14,142 in 2024.
- Grapevine print magazine income increased 3% in 2024, mainly due to a price increase-the first in 12 years. Subscription income for GV Online, GV Complete and the GV App increased 25% due to growth in the number of subscribers.
- 2024 Grapevine results were a gross margin on subscriptions of \$766,004 and a gross margin of \$824,391 on other published items. Operating expenses of \$2,457,623 resulted in an operating loss of \$851,735 compared to a loss of \$857,144 in 2023.
- General Fund support of La Viña service activity was \$571,939 in 2024, compared to \$755,749 in 2023.
- La Viña circulation increased by 17% in 2024 compared to a 3% decrease in 2023.

2025 GSO BUDGET

- Operating revenue \$20,523,275 compared to \$19,719,318 in 2024.
 - Contributions \$11,000,000 compared to \$11,248,573 in 2024.
 - Literature gross margin \$8,750,000 compared to \$7,639,508 in 2024.
- Total operating expense \$19,495,343 before \$945,632 depreciation compared to \$18,684,246 before \$843,246 depreciation in 2024.
- Operating surplus of \$1,027,932 before depreciation compared to \$1,035,072 surplus in 2024.
- Capital expenditures of \$2,374,982, including GSO retrofit budgeted at \$2,030,000. Without retrofit, \$344,982 compared to \$199,267 in 2024.

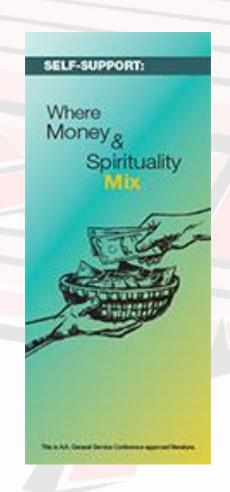

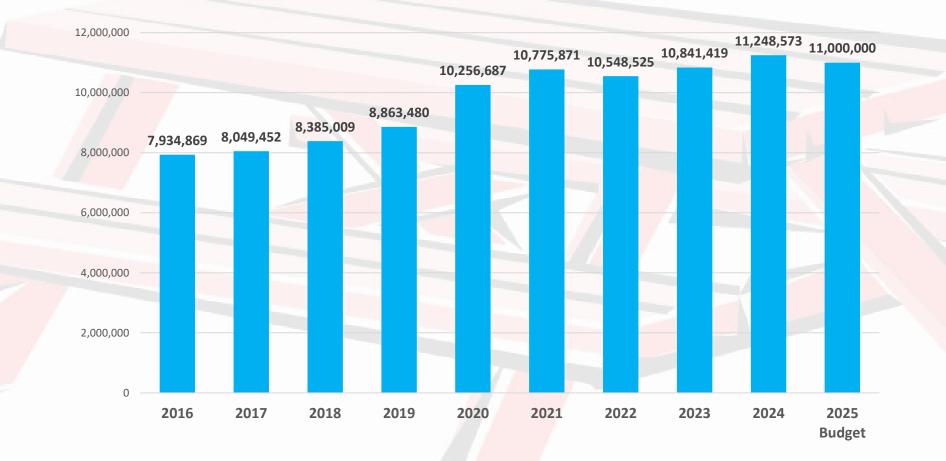

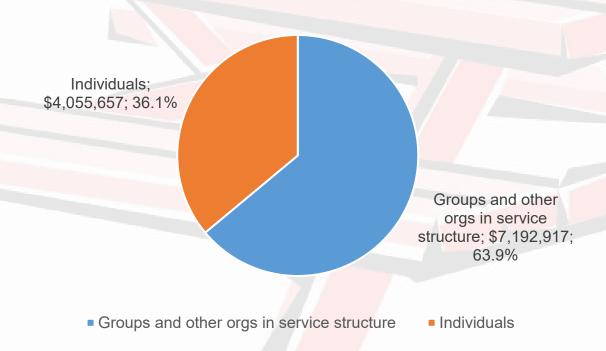

SEVENTH TRADITION SELF-SUPPORT - 2016 - 2025



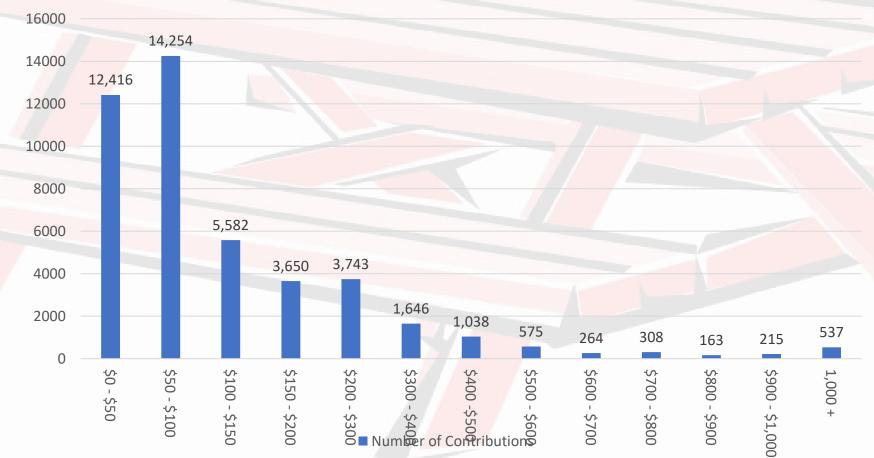
CONTRIBUTIONS BY TYPE OF CONTRIBUTOR 2024



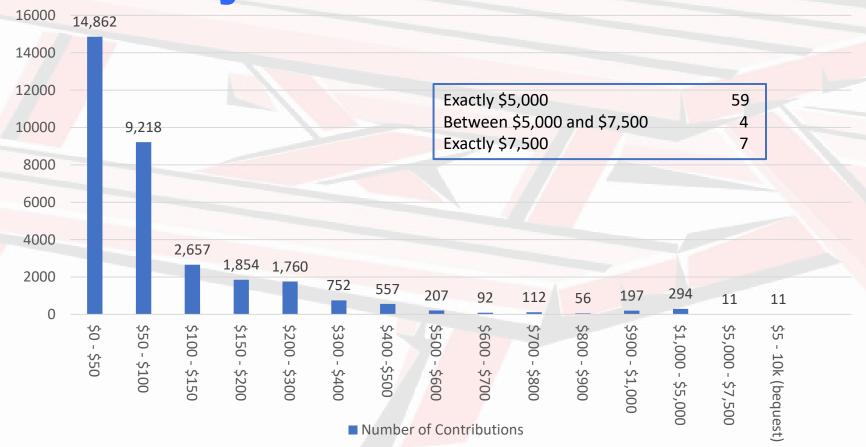

Number of Group Contributions by Dollar Value 2024



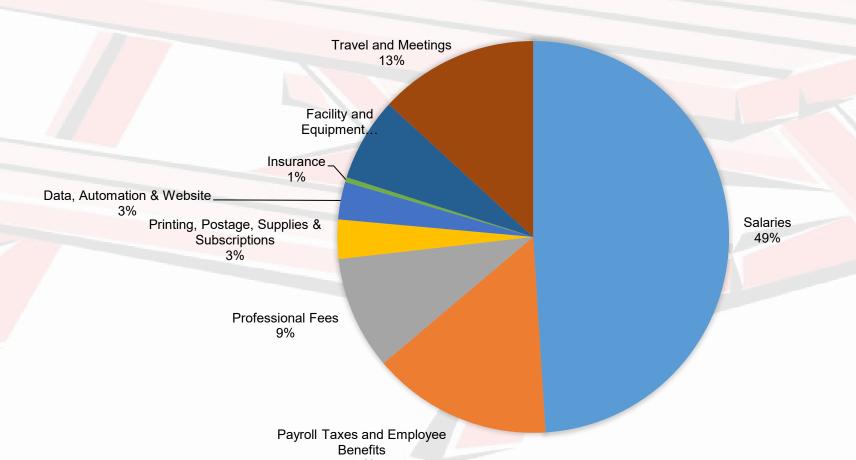
Number of Individual Contributions by Dollar Value 2024



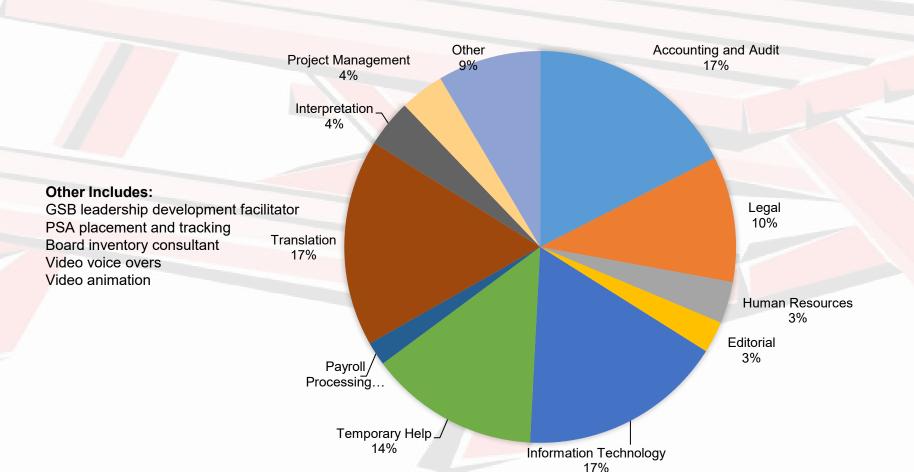

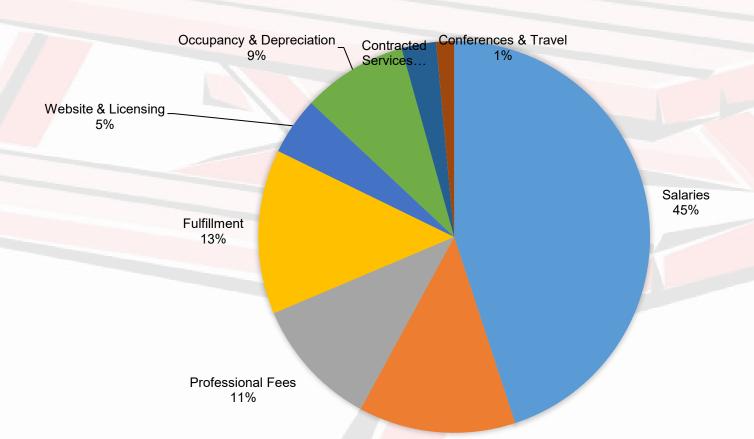




GSO PROFESSIONAL FEES- 2024 PERCENTAGE BREAKDOWN

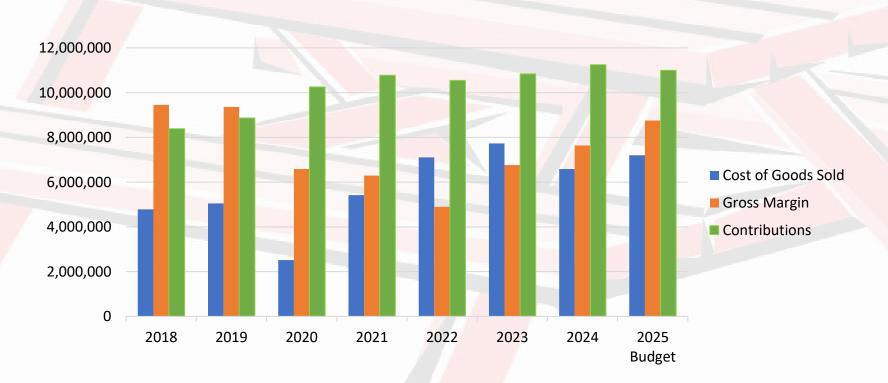

- Broadly, this could include, whether planned or unplanned:
 - Operating Deficits of AAWS or Grapevine
 - Periodic expenditures such as an office renovation or major technical upgrade
 - Extraordinary expenses outside of "normal" operations
- ❖ A Reserve Fund policy was adopted by the General Service Board in 2022.

AAWS Board Report

Quick Highlights

- February 2024 to February 2025 there were 168 meetings and 1750 documents that your AAWS Board has engaged in to fulfil its service responsibilities.
- in 2024, across the Front Desk, Member Services, GSO Staff Services and the Mail Room team they have responded to approximately 20,000 phone calls, 186,000 emails, and processed 41,000 pieces of mail. GSO welcomed 1693 visitors in 2024. These numbers don't include the other departments.
- During the year between the annual meetings of the GSC, AAWS collaborates with the Trustees Finance and Budgetary Committee (TFBC) on the Quarterly Financial Reports (QFR), the Staff assignments provide Activity Updates, AAWS Highlights are distributed after each meeting, and AAWS Board Reports are provided to the GSB at each meeting, and these are then summarized in the GSO Quarterly Report. Box 459 remains a staple in our communications.

Agenda J.

- Consider a proposed pilot for a Harmony and Effectiveness Session.
- The committee reviewed and discussed a pilot proposal for a Harmony and Effectiveness Session and agreed to take no action. The committee discussed the 2024 Advisory Action related to meeting outside of the annual meeting for general sharing sessions at least two times per year utilizing virtual meeting technology... The committee agreed that these current opportunities, such as quarterly sharing sessions and the "What's on Your Mind" sessions held during each Conference week, provide ample opportunity for Conference Members to discuss harmony and effectiveness.



CPC E.

- Discuss shared experience in informing professionals how A.A. can serve as a resource for unhoused and neurodivergent alcoholics.
- The committee discussed the shared experience on informing professionals how A.A. can serve as a resource for unhoused and neurodivergent alcoholics and took no action. The committee noted that there is a duplication of efforts within conference committees regarding neurodivergent alcoholics. The committee agreed that there was no new information compelling to reverse the 74th General Service Conference decision to take no action





Finance A.

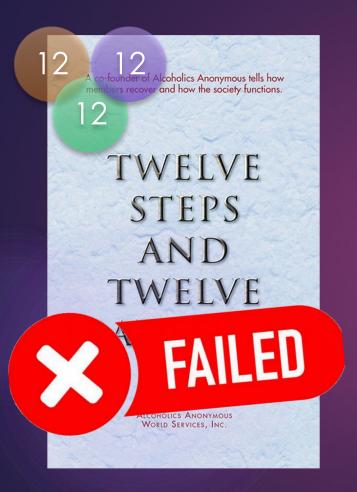
- Consider a request to reaffirm the 1975 Advisory Action that delegates emphasize to the groups the effect that inflation has had on the contribution of dollar and the necessity for adjusting contributions accordingly, to support services provided by the General Service Board.
- The committee discussed the 2024 floor action to reaffirm the 1975 Advisory Action...and took no action. The committee discussed that each delegate has the autonomy to report financial information and may include details of the services being provided which will help districts, groups and individuals adjust their contributions accordingly.

- The committee recommended that an FAQ addressing, "What happens if a group decides not to hear a GSR report?" be added to Chapter 1 FAQs section on page 12 in the next revision of The A.A. Service Manual.`



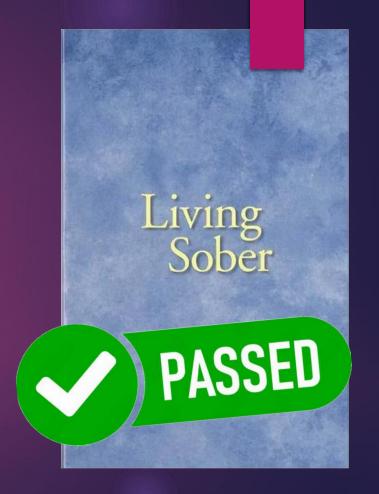

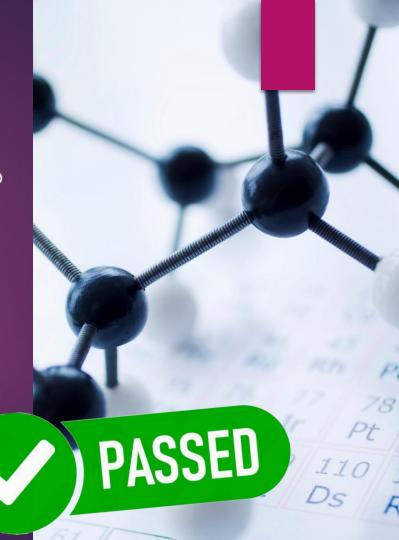
- Discuss Plain Language Big Book review process.
- The committee recommended that proposals to rescind or revise the Plain Language Big Book be collected and deferred until the 77th General Service Conference to allow for a wider Fellowship experience.
- The committee recommended the development of a process within the trustees' Literature Committee for receiving, assessing and forwarding proposed changes to the Plain Language Big Book to the Conference Committee on Literature.



Public Information B.3.

Consider suggestion to develop new video PSA.

The committee recommended that three videos produced by the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous Australia ("Are you risking your job?" "Are you a danger to your family?" "Cham-pain") be adapted by AAWS for use on media platforms in the U.S. and Canada.



Public Information B.3.

The committee suggested that the trustees' Public Information Committee create a plan to develop a new short video targeting culturally diverse audiences, appropriate for use as a PSA and on social media and other channels. The committee suggested that the new video be short, emotionally powerful, utilize a question-and-answer style, and feature no spoken dialogue.



Policy/Admissions E.



 Consider request that a Super Majority of voting members be required to change or amend Founders Literature.

The committee considered a request that a super majority of voting members be required to change or amend Founder's Literature and took no action. The committee expressed the importance of this topic but also noted that developing a policy on possible voting requirements and procedures may be preemptive prior to defining what would be categorized as co-founders' writings.

Policy/Admissions E.



- To provide clarity on the nuances between similar PAIs on potential changes that were forwarded about the co-founder's writings to the Report and Charter and the Policy/Admissions committees, both committees met briefly during their Tuesday committee times to ensure the distinct function of these agenda topics and avoid potential overlaps or confusion.
- The committee noted that, prior to approving a defined procedure on future considerations for changes to co-founders' writings, a two-year process might be considered prior to a voting decision by the Conference to provide more opportunity for input from the fellowship..

Report and Charter A.3.

- Consider a request to remove the word "woman" from the Concept IV essay.
- The committee recommended that the word "woman" be removed from the Concept Four essay, so that:
 - "New volunteer corporate directors will ask why any paid woman staff member should also be a corporate director and thereby have a vote as good as their own."
- Be changed to:
 - "New volunteer corporate directors will ask why any paid staff member should also be a corporate director and thereby have a vote as good as their own.".



Report and Charter B.

- Consider a request to expand Article Three in the Conference Charter to protect the co-Founders' writings.
- The Conference Report and Charter
 Committee discussed the requests for a revision
 to Article Three of the Conference Charter in
 relation to changes to the co- founder's
 writings and took no action. The committee
 noted that further clarification was needed on
 the definition of co-founder's writings prior to
 considering changes in policy or to the
 Conference Charter.



Report and Charter B.

- Consider a request to expand Article Three in the Conference Charter to protect the co-Founders' writings.
- The committee recommended that the General Service Board classify all AAWS and AA Grapevine literature written prior to 1971 as Recovery, Service, or Archival/Historical; review existing policies and consider proposing additional policies as appropriate for updating each classification, and that a progress report be provided to the 2026 General Service Conference.



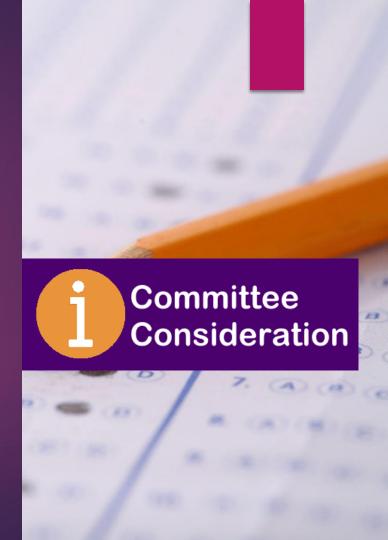

Corrections

- The committee reviewed a progress report on the development of a pamphlet on the transgender alcoholic in A.A. and expressed support for the process that has occurred to date. The committee requested that a progress report be brought back to the 2026 Conference Committee on Corrections.
- The committee reviewed a request to update Appendix IV in the book Alcoholics Anonymous to include other awards and commendations received by A.A. since 1951 and suggested that the trustees' Literature Committee add a footnote to Appendix IV of the 5th Edition Alcoholics Anonymous, directing members to the Awards and Recognition section on www.aa.org for information on more recent awards.



Treatment and Accessibilities



- Review revision of the conference-approved flyer "Where do I go from here" (F-4).
- The committee recommended the update to the flyer "Where do I go From Here?" (F-4) to be approved with the following change:
- The sentence which currently reads:
 - "This mutual understanding gave them the strength each desperately needed to pass up the first drink that had always paved the way to disaster."
- Be replaced with the following sentence:
 - "This mutual understanding and program of recovery gave them the strength each desperately needed to pass up the first drink that had always paved the way to disaster.

The committee recommended that the Conference-approved level of \$10,000 for individual bequests to the General Service Board from A.A. members be raised to \$12,500.



- Review suggested area contribution for delegate expense for the Conference.
- The committee recommended that the suggested area contribution for delegate expense for the Conference be removed and that the full estimated amount be provided so that each area can determine what amount they can contribute.



The committee recommended that the General Service Board Quarterly Financial Report include supplemental reporting on current capital projects and current and future associated maintenance costs.





The committee recommended pausing the retrofit of the General Service Office until the Trustees Finance & Budgetary Committee develops a plan to replenish the reserve fund to a minimum of nine months and bring back a progress report to the 76th General Service Conference.

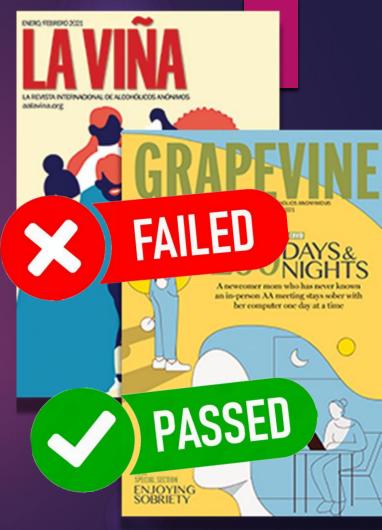

The revised plan should reflect a focus on actionable, realistic and achievable goals, and the background materials should include at least five years of financial history that substantiates its projections.
- The committee recommended that five-year plans for both Grapevine and La Viña be reviewed annually by the Conference Committee on the AA Grapevine and La Viña. The background materials for both plans should include at least five years of financial history and any relevant historical and/or strategic narrative that supports their projections.



Grapevine

- Consider request to revise the pamphlet "Grapevine and La Vina: Our meetings in print."
- The committee recommended that the pamphlet "Grapevine and La Viña: Our Meetings in Print" (P-52) be revised to clarify the text and accurately reflect changes in Grapevine operations.

The committee recommended that the Grapevine Board obtain feedback from the Fellowship by conducting a survey of the membership to identify relevance, usefulness and financial viability of products and services provided by Grapevine, such as the magazine, books (print, digital, and audio), podcast and social media (Instagram and YouTube), with a progress report to be brought back to the 2026 Conference Committee on AA Grapevine and La Viña, and a final report be provided to the 2027 committee.



CPC

Review progress report on the development of outward facing pamphlet for mental health professionals.

The committee recommended that the project for the development of an outward facing pamphlet for mental health professionals be redirected, utilizing existing content in the current draft and reformatted in a quad-fold layout. The committee requests that a draft pamphlet or progress report be brought back to the 2026 Conference Committee on Cooperation with the Professional Community.

The committee recommended that, on a one-year trial basis, AAWS subscribe to a LinkedIn premium account at a cost not to exceed \$1,000 per year, and to bring back a report on the effectiveness of the upgraded account to the 2026 Conference Committee on Cooperation with the Professional Community.



Policy/Admissions



- Discuss the process of Simple Majority Items.
- The committee recommended rescinding the 1986 Advisory Action on simple majority items which reads as follows:
 - "If a committee recommendation does not receive the two-thirds vote required to become a Conference Advisory Action, but has a majority of votes, it automatically becomes a suggestion and be duly noted in the Conference Report."
- And that it be replaced with the following clarifying language:
 - "Recommendations achieving simple majority, but not substantial unanimity, are not suggestions to the General Service Board to take action but should be memorialized in the Conference Final Report to be informational and to provide historical context."

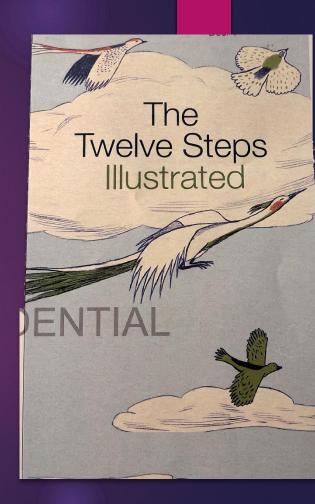

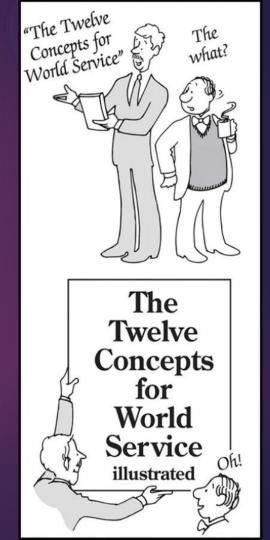

The committee recommended that the A.A. World Services social media policy currently under review be brought back to the 2026 Conference Committee on Public Information for approval prior to implementation.

The committee recommended that the trustees' Public Information Committee develop a plan to accept user-generated content from members under the age of 18, with the understanding that questions of legal responsibility or liability may need to be explored. The committee requested that an update report or draft plan be brought back to the 2026 Conference Committee on Public Information.



- Review PSAs for Relevance and Usefulness.
- The committee recommended that the trustees' PI Committee review of video Public Service Announcements (PSAs) be changed to a review cadence of five years from the release date of each video. The review of audio PSAs should follow a similar cadence.

- Review progress report on developing communications to address anonymity and social media.
- The committee recommended that the pamphlet "Understanding Anonymity" (P-47) be revised to address anonymity and social media and looks forward to a draft or an update report to be brought to the 2026 Conference Committee on Public Information.
- Review progress report on communicating with young people.
- The committee recommended that a new Service Card, postcard sized or smaller, aimed at young people, be created and that it be made available digitally and for purchase and for inclusion in the PI Service Kit.



- Review report from the A.A. Membership Survey working group.
- Public Information Committee develop a plan for a 2026 A.A. Membership Survey utilizing random sampling methodology. The committee requested that the plan for the 2026 Membership Survey be brought to the 2026 Conference Committee on Public Information.
- The committee recommended that in addition to the Membership Survey conducted using random sampling, the trustee's Public Information Committee conduct a Convenience Sample Membership Survey in 2026.



- Review progress report on Young People's video project.
- The committee recommended that the video "A Group of People Just Like Me" be discontinued.
- The committee recommended that the video A.A. "On the Beach" be discontinued.
- The committee recommended that the young people video "Alcoholics Anonymous" be discontinued.
- The committee recommended that the video "25 and Under" be discontinued.
- The committee recommended that the video "Young and Sober in AA from Drinking to Recovery" be discontinued.
- The committee recommended that efforts to collect usergenerated young people videos be discontinued.





The committee recommended that the General Service Board, keeping in mind A.A.'s Twelve Traditions, develop a strategy and vision for digital communications including social media and increase resources for these tools to enhance efforts to carry the message.

The committee discussed the ongoing problem of the significant workload on the Conference Committee on Public Information agenda and recommended that the General Service Conference add an agenda item to the 2026 agenda for the Policy and Admissions Committee to explore creation of a new conference committee to which some of the Public Information agenda could be assigned.

Floor Actions

- Can be made to Chair at start of sessions.
- Motion maker given 2 minutes to state the rationale behind.
- The chair will then ask if there is a motion to decline to consider the floor action:
 - Made without comment.
 - Only allowed after floor action motion maker states rationale.
 - Requires a 2nd.
 - Not debatable.
 - Requires 2/3 majority.
 - No minority opinion.
- Conference voted 129 to 4 to adopt these rules.



Floor Action #1 - Censure

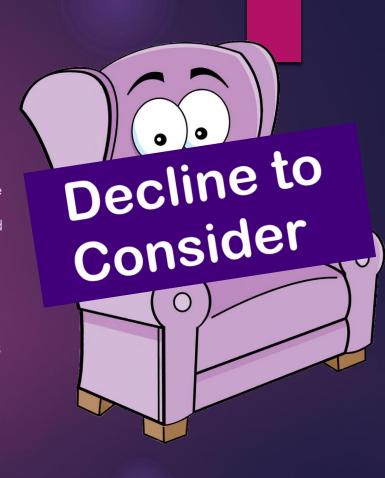
- The 75th General Service Conference issues a censure, expressing formal disapproval for past behavior of the General Service Board for the following reasons:
 - Contributing to an environment that led to the resignation of experienced and trusted Board members;
 - Ineffective, inconsistent, and non-transparent communication to the Conference;
 - Unacceptable behavior by trustees including harassment, intimidation, and bullying;
 - Undermining the spiritual handshake with the Conference, as described in Concept VI, by not following a Conference Advisory Action.
- Accordingly, the Conference directs the General Service Board to:
 - Continue to take its inventory, with specific focus on improving accountability to the Conference;
 - Report to the Conference on inventory findings and the specific actions taken to address these concerns.

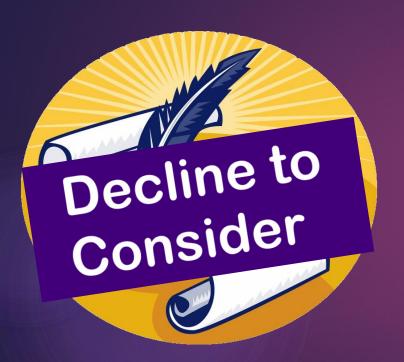


Floor Action #2 – Delegate Chair

I move to change the election procedure of the GSC Delegate Chair to the following:

Each Conference Committee will nominate a willing and eligible candidate to stand for Delegate Chair after their election of Conference Committee Chair and Alternate Chair on their last committee meeting day of the General Service Conference. The nominee will be determined by each individual Conference Committee. The newly elected Conference Committee Chair will not be an eligible candidate for Delegate Chair. The Alternate Conference Committee Chair will be an eligible candidate. After the Trustee elections a the GSC each nominee will have a 1–2-minute opportunity to give a brief history and qualification. The Delegate Chair will then be elected by Third Legacy Procedure of the voting Area Delegates. Only the voting Area Delegates will be able to vote for their Delegate Chair. The Policy & Admissions Committee will be tasked to create a scope for the Delegate Chair Position based on what the committee determines are the needs of the Area Delegates of the GSC and for that to be brought to the 76th GSC. The Delegate with the most votes will be the newly elected Delegate Chair, the runner up will be the GSC Mail Administrator. The Delegates with the third and fourth most votes will be the alternates, if the need to serve arises.

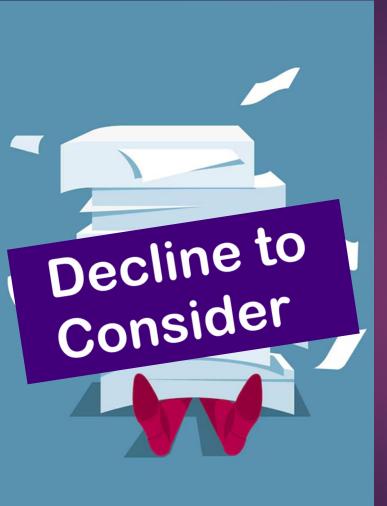




Floor Action #3 – Preamble

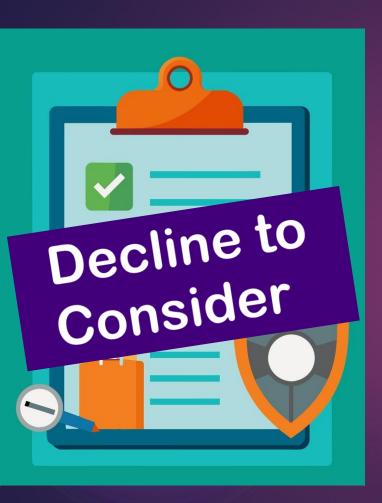
Motion: The GSB Revisit the Advisory Actions of the 71st General Service conference regarding the A.A. Preamble and approve the following as the only conference approved A.A. Preamble.

"In Alcoholics Anonymous, we share our experience, strength and hope with each other that we may solve our common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism. The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking. There are no dues or fees for A.A. membership; we are self-supporting through our own contributions. A.A. is not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, organization or institution; does not wish to engage in any controversy; neither endorses nor opposes any causes. Our primary purpose is to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.



Floor Action #4 – Agenda Items

That the GSB, by and through its Trustees Committees, reduce the number of standing agenda items at each GS Conference to allow more room for PAI's submitted by the Fellowship. That workbooks, service material and guidance type pamphlets, for example, be reviewed every three to five years instead of annually or biennially, and that they be alternated so that each conference committee has no more than one or two standing agenda items each year. Status updates and progress reports on continuing agenda items be discussed during joint committee meetings instead and reported to the conference through the Trustee committee conference reports. Themes, discussion topics, book titles, and the like be polled to the delegates electronically using survey methodology. Etc



Floor Action #5 – Code of Conduct

We ask that the current code of conduct be repealed. The Steps, Traditions, and Concepts (with the warranties) serve as complete set of principles, codified for all in A.A. to resolve all questions of proper conduct; in other words, a comprehensive code of conduct. The Charter and Bylaws provide the mechanism connecting us to the outside world, and the Bylaws require adherence to these 3 sets of principles. The Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments, empowering the trustees to manage & conduct world service affairs (Concept VII).

Floor Action #6 – Pamphlet Change

That the pamphlet A.A. in Treatment Settings (p-27) [SP-27 in Spanish], in the section that says, "Alcoholics Anonymous does not:", be amended as follows: [A.A. does not] "provide detoxification or nursing services, hospitalization, drugs or any medical and psychiatric treatment," should read:[A.A. does not] "provide or directly engage in detoxification services, nursing, hospitalization, medicine or any medical, psychiatric, psychological or therapeutic treatment."

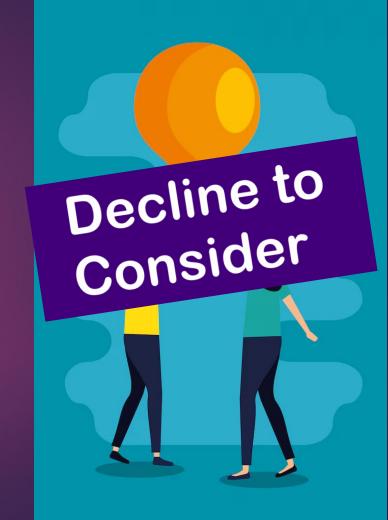

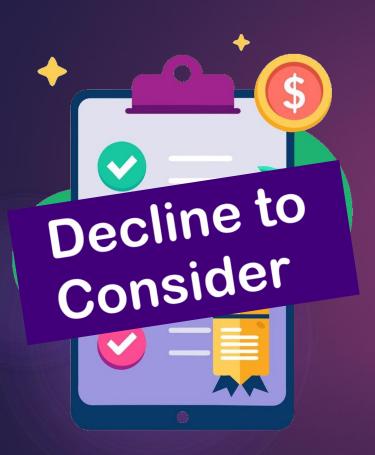

Floor Action #8 – Agenda Committee Right of Decision

The Conference hereby allow the Conference Agenda Committee the right of decision over the Conference theme, presentation(s) and workshops, allowing the Conference to focus on the more important matters facing the Fellowship today.





Floor Action #9 – Prudent Reserve

That in order to assist in the improvement of the prudent reserve, the GSB set a policy which does not allow the budgeted income from all streams including, but not limited to, contributions, sale of literature, including Grapevine and LaVina subscriptions and book sales, for any given year to exceed the amounts of the immediately preceding year. Further, and consistent with such policy, that outward expenses be adjusted, with necessary cost cutting measures, so that all expenses, obligations or support does not exceed budgeted income. This to be in effect until the prudent reserve reaches the Board's policy of 9-12 months and thereafter as the Board may deem fit pursuant to its Reserve Fund Policy.



Decline to Consider

Floor Action #10 – GSO Renovation

That a joint subcommittee comprised of representatives from the General Service Board, A.A. World Services Board, AA Grapevine Board, the General Manager, and the Grapevine Publisher be formed to: 1. Reevaluate the viability and timing of the 11th floor construction project, with an estimated cost of up to \$2 million, with the intent to cut our losses. 2. Determine whether to retain or release the 8th floor at 475 Riverside Drive. 3. Delay any further construction or long-term occupancy decisions until a future relocation process — fully informed by the evolving needs of the Fellowship — can appropriately assess and determine space requirements.
